Voter Service Committee Report

The fall had the Voter Service committee quite busy with both general election candidate forums and the general election Voter Guide.

Judy Knight gets a huge thank you for all her work on the Voter Guide. Members and friends were also quite involved with the production of the guide, crafting well thought out questions, assisting with mailings to the candidates and wording for the introductory material in the guide, and editing the final copy that was sent to the Boomerang.

The Laramie Boomerang staff published the best guide in many years, based on the feedback members have received and I agreed.

The Voter Guide was also posted on the League of Women Voters of Wyoming's web site and "typed" hard copies supplied to many venues around town, in advance of the Boomerang's publication (with their permission) and we have also received positive feedback from the public in having access to the Guide through other venues and prior to the Boomerang's publication.

We hosted five candidate forums, all in partnership with the Albany County Public Library (ACPL). The ACPL provided us with their public meeting room, free of charge, and assisted with the sound system and set-up. We are very thankful for their continued support.

Forum attendance was good and, as expected, the forums for County and City offices had greater attendance. We struggled with microphones and speaker system during the primary election forums and with the first of our general election forums. In addition, our videographers were working on their knees quite a bit as we lacked a good "mount" for the video camera. Thanks to Al Tremblay, who supplied an improved speaker/mic system and rolling camera mount that greatly improved the audio for the forums and made our videographer's job much easier! We were fortunate to have both Anne Alexander and Mike Massie as moderators again with each taking two of the forums and Ollie Walter as moderator for our fifth forum. A big thanks to all of them.

Voter Service is a primary service area of the League and we are appreciative of all the hard work and support we receive from our members and friends.

Art Show - "Sacred Water"

In 2018 a well-attended show commemorating the "gift of water" and "our role in preserving it" was held in the Undercroft at St. Matthew's Cathedral. "Sacred Water," this year's show, celebrates our sacred relationship to water and is enthusiastically sponsored by ArtConnect, the Haub School of Environment and Natural Resources and Albany County Clean Water Advocates. Over seventy works of art created by 21 artists as well as Laramie High School students will be shown. Most of the works will be offered for sale, and a children's book will be for sale.

There will be a reception at ArtConnect, 302 South. 2nd, on April 5 from 6-8. Light refreshments will be served. The show will continue until April 27. ArtConnect is an exciting new community gallery that began in 2018 in conjunction with Works of Wyoming. The show will be a kick off to the Shepard Symposium. The Shepard Symposium this year focuses on "Radical Listening." Australian Artist and Educator Paul Taylor will feature his community mural "Snowy Range Rainbow", designed by Laramie High School Art students and teachers; and painted by participants at the 2018 Shepard Symposium. The mural is based on the ancient Australian Aboriginal cultural Law of "Caring for Country", caring for your water, brought to the people by the great ancestral Rainbow Serpent.

Other Featured artists during the show are Laramie Photographer Susan Davis, who will show her photos; local artists whose works were chosen from entries to the show and Steve Fryberger who will display his oil paintings; Susan's photos of the Snowy Range explore two areas she loves—Lookout Lake and the North Fork of the Little Laramie River. Traveling along Lookout Lake, early in the morning, she happily found marmots greeting the day, who then, unexpectedly, became part of the focus of this exhibit.

Steve and his wife Franci once lived in Oman where Steve worked as a Geologist. While there, he painted scenes that fascinated him, including ordinary life and water. He also wrote and illustrated a children's book called *Mabrouk the Lucky Goat*. The book, which will be for sale during the show, is based on a real young woman-Fatima who the Frybergers met in a village at the edge of the Oman Mountains – as well as her feisty goat Mabrouk, who is always running away. In the story, an earthquake occurs which cuts off the village water supply, and the

village must be abandoned and the goats sold! But true to form, Mabrouk runs away and discovers a new water supply, a spring on a hillside, and all is saved! It's a story that combines real-world geology with the overwhelming importance of water to a village that exists within the Islamic culture of Oman. Each hardcover book comes with a CD audio version that is read aloud in English and Arabic. Steve has donated a percentage of the sale of the book to ArtConnect and ACCWA.

History Corner

Wyoming History Highlight - Juries

Wyoming Territory was the first governmental jurisdiction anywhere to grant full suffrage to women in December of 1869. We all know by now that the first woman to vote on an equal basis with men was Louisa Swain of Laramie in September of 1870.

You also probably know that Laramie had the first jury in the western world (so far as we know) to have women serving on it. That was in March of 1870, fully six months before Louisa's historic vote.

But did you know that Wyoming judges were not enamored of having women on juries? The exception was Judge Howe who presided in the First Judicial District Court in Laramie. He was also the chief justice of the Wyoming Supreme Court. But Justice Howe was only in office a short time and though there was another jury with women in 1871, and another in the 1880s, women did not serve on juries again until—can you believe this—the 1950s! Justice Howe's replacement had a different attitude that prevailed with practically all Wyoming judges for nearly 70 years.

That it would take until 1950 for women to regain the right they had been granted in 1869 is astounding. It finally became possible because of a Legislative Act in February of 1949 that made it clear that both men and women were qualified as jurors if they met other requirements like being a US citizen, etc. That law was somewhat redundant if the Wyoming Constitution is read correctly which clearly states that women have the same rights as men.

Even after enactment into law, an Albany County defense attorney immediately challenged it as unconstitutional. But the Wyoming Supreme Court ruled on May 5, 1950 that the statute was sufficient and no change to the constitution was necessary. So the way was clear for the first trial on which women served, which happened to be in Sweetwater County. A woman, Louise Spinner Graf, was selected as the foreman of that jury.

Biographical Database of NAWSA Suffragists, 1890-1920

Biography of Theresa Alberta Parkinson Jenkins, 1853-1936

When Theresa Parkinson Jenkins arrived in Cheyenne with her new husband James F. Jenkins on December 20, 1877, she already had the right to vote in her new Territory. She became interested in education and promoted rural school buildings to replace homes. During the visit of Frances Willard to Wyoming in 1883, Jenkins joined the Women's Christian Temperance Union and promoted a law that required schools to teach the damaging effects of alcohol and narcotics. Gradually, she became more active in electoral concerns, as well.

In 1889, as Wyoming held a Constitutional Convention in its bid for statehood, she took an active part in preserving the clause "The right to vote and hold office shall not be abridged on account of sex," exercising her influence on reluctant members of the Unites States Congress, in particular, those from her native Wisconsin. The achievement of statehood in 1890 was celebrated at the Capitol where the women of the state presented a flag upon which was inscribed, "To Wyoming from her women in honor of the State Constitution." Jenkins was chosen to make the presentation speech, as described by the State Historical Society: "Mrs. Theresa A. Jenkins was then introduced to the audience. Proceeding to the front of the platform built over the steps of the Capitol building, the lady in clear, forceful tones, which penetrated to the very outskirts of a crowd of ten thousand, began and delivered without notes or manuscript an address, which in ability, logic and eloquence has rarely, if ever been equaled by any woman of the land. She was grandly equal to the occasion. At the conclusion of her address, Mrs. Jenkins received an ovation and a magnificent basket of flowers." Jenkins called for honor for Mrs. (Esther) Morris and Mrs. (Amalia) Post, as well as the men who were instrumental in retaining female suffrage in the Wyoming Constitution. The text of her oration, printed in the Cheyenne newspapers, may be found in Fleming 1990.

She later spoke several times in Colorado on behalf of the suffrage movement there, and also in Kansas and other states, as well as on behalf of prohibition. In 1892 she was elected to attend the Republican National Convention in Minneapolis. In 1894, she was the Superintendent of Schools in Laramie County.

According to Beach, at the WCTU World's Convention in Boston in 1911, when asked to present a flag representative of Wyoming, Jenkins gave a flag of white silk with a blue field in which there was one star marked "Wyoming." In her address, she said, "Ere a decade shall have passed away other stars shall encircle this star." (By that time, however, other Western states had granted female suffrage.) She attended the national convention of the National Suffrage Society in 1919. When the Wyoming legislators and Governor unanimously ratified the 19th amendment to the U.S. Constitution in a special session on January 26, 1920, Jenkins was called upon to thank them. Jenkins was active in the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Grand Army of the Republic, and the Auxiliary of the United Spanish War Veterans.

- f. Emergency Preparedness: Support emergency preparedness policies and programs to ensure that people in Albany County can be adequately notified and aided in the event of local emergencies in order to assure their health and safety. (adopted 2008, reworded 2010, 2011, 2019)
- g. Support diversity, equity, and inclusion in and make-up of all appointed boards and commissions based on gender and other forms of diversity. (adopted 2017, reworded 2019)

Human Resources

a. Support comprehensive physical and mental health care and planning for community health needs. (reworded 2011)

- b. Support education efforts in areas including, but no limited to, stewardship of democracy, affirming diversity, equity, and inclusion, disability awareness, literacy, parenting/life skills, discipline/respect, health care and sexuality, conflict resolution, suicide-prevention, antibullying, anti-violence, and dangers effects of substance abuse. (reworded 2010, 2016, 2019)
- c. Support affordable full-time, after school, drop-in and sick-child care for preschool and primary school age children in Albany County. (adopted 2000)
- d. Support income-sensitive housing in Albany County, with an emphasis on needs of the very low income and special needs populations. Support the development of minimum standards of health, sanitation, and safety in rental. (reworded 2019)
- e. Support the development of minimum standards of health, sanitation, and safety in rental housing. (adopted 2002, "income sensitive" added 2008, reworded 2011, 2019)
- f. Support efforts to provide shelter and services for Albany County homeless population. (added 2019)
- g. Support smoke-free workplaces in the community. (adopted 2004)
- h. Support employment and housing practices that do not allow discrimination.

Crime

- a. Encourage the coordination of local service efforts in the areas of crime prevention, early intervention and treatment services. (adopted 1994)
- b. Encourage community efforts to emphasize address the connection between the effects of mental health issues, substance abuse, personal injury, accidental death, and crime in Albany County. (reworded 2011)

- b. Support multi-modal transportation in Albany County, with adequate provisions and enforcement for safe pedestrian, bicycle, bus and automobile traffic. Support bike path marking and maintenance. (adopted 2006; reworded 2010, 2011)
- c. Support convenient and reliable public access to interstate and intra-state transportation by public carriers. (adopted 2005)
- d. Support a transportation master plan for Laramie and Albany County with annual review and provision for adequate input by local citizens. (adopted 2006, reworded 2011)

Immigration

- a. Support equitable treatment and opportunities to include education, scholarships, driver's licenses, bank accounts, employment, housing, and social services for all residents of Wyoming regardless of immigration status. (adopted 2018)




